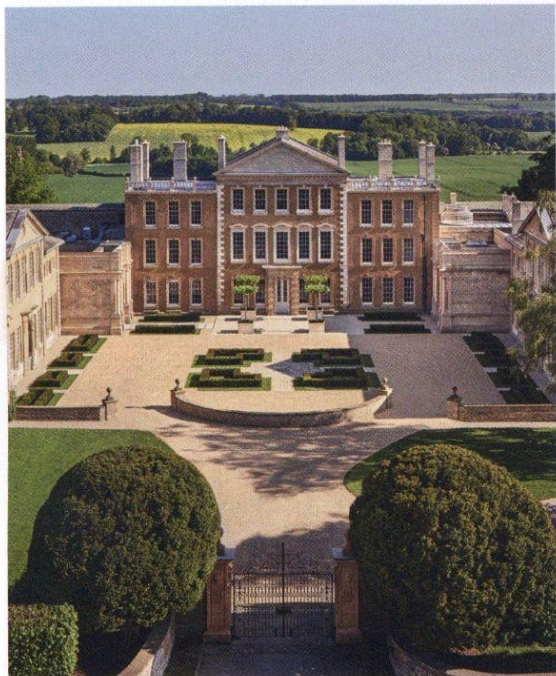

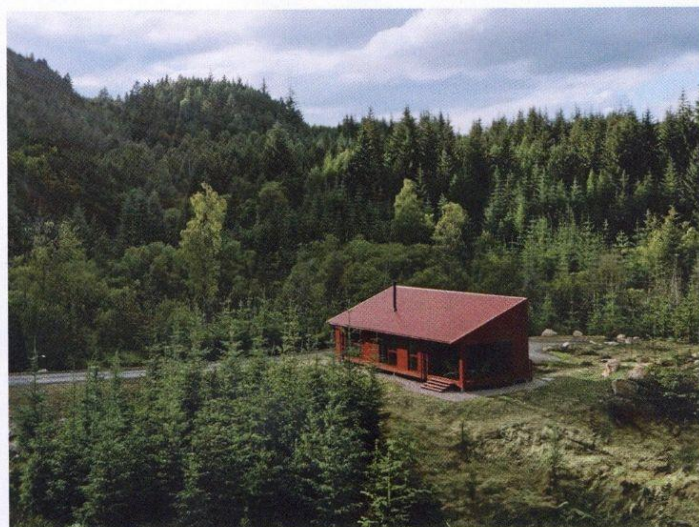
98 RH England

As American furniture businesses go, RH (formerly Restoration Hardware) is something of a superpower – in scale and in influence. The interiors specialist calls its 70-odd showrooms ‘galleries’, and the biggest of these has just opened in the UK – its first outpost outside North America. RH England has taken over a 73-acre Cotswolds estate with a 17th-century country house at its heart (below). The 60 rooms at Aynho Park have been reimagined as an immersive retail experience, where RH’s collections (from classic to contemporary) are presented in inspiring vignettes, alongside three restaurants, a wine lounge and a tea salon. There are whispers of further galleries in London and on the Continent, but Aynho Park is a truly unique proposition. **DN** rh.com



99 Buchanan Studio

Buchanan Studio is a burgeoning force to be reckoned with in the interiors business, with substantial hospitality projects underway in Venice as well as London. And this *House & Garden* Top 100 studio is also part of a wave of interiors practices that are including product design as an important aspect of their offering. So far, founders Angus Buchanan and his wife Charlotte (above) have developed eye-catching upholstered furniture, marble-topped tables, and fabric by the metre, all of it with a fashion-forward feel. **DN** buchanan.studio



100 Atholl Estate's loch stock

Designer woodland cabins are popping up everywhere, from Norfolk to the grounds of handsome Scottish estates. One such estate is Atholl near Dunkeld, where five cabins have been developed in a collaboration between Turner Pocock and Alastair Forbes Architects. The cabins (right) were designed on stilts to have minimal environmental impact and are clad in local larch. Views of Cally Loch, wildlife walks and evenings spent on the verandah or by the wood-burning stove make them quite the Scottish bothy. **AG** atholl-estates.co.uk
