CONCRETE CARE



Concrete and Weathered Concrete - Our concrete has inherent variations in shading and color as well as in the casting process, making each table unique; no two are exactly alike. As a natural outcome of the casting process, concrete round tables are not symmetrical, and any binding edge may not be flush to the concrete. Concrete may exhibit spots, hairline cracks and scratches due to exposure to the elements and usage.

CARE

3"-THICK CONCRETE

Clean with a damp cloth. Avoid abrasive soaps and cleansers. Wipe up spills quickly to avoid staining. Do not cut directly on the concrete tabletops. When not in use, a custom-fit cover must be used to guard against moisture and the elements. This will protect the finish and prolong the life of your furniture.

To remove scuff marks and slight scratches from tabletops, clean with Holloway House® Lemon Oil. Place a small amount of the lemon oil onto a clean cotton cloth and wipe down entire surface of concrete until the oil is evenly applied and marks disappear. Use another clean cotton cloth to wipe up excess oil until surface is dry to the touch.

Tabletops are sealed with a clear, water-based acrylic coating. Resealing becomes necessary when highs and lows in the sheen of your tabletop become visible. Depending on amount of use and exposure to the elements, resealing may need to be completed at the end of each season, or as needed.

1½"-THICK WEATHERED CONCRETE

Clean with a damp cloth. Avoid abrasive soaps and cleansers. Wipe up spills quickly to avoid staining. Do not cut directly on the concrete tabletops. When not in use, a custom-fit cover must be used to guard against moisture and the elements. This will protect the finish and prolong the life of your furniture. Do not use oil on Weathered Concrete tabletops.

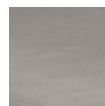

ABOUT OAK

Oak furniture is an excellent choice for outdoor living and, if properly maintained, will last a lifetime. While oak is exceptionally durable and strong, promising years of loyal service, it does require some maintenance. If you are unable to perform regular maintenance, contact a professional refinisher in your area for assistance.

CHARACTERISTICS OF OAK

- Oak may continue to crack if exposed to severe weather. The use of our outdoor covers is strongly recommended.
- As oak seasons, it may release tannins, a natural property of oak that helps deter fungus and insects. This organic process occurs most frequently when oak is exposed to rain or heavy moisture
- Tannins released from oak will stain concrete or stone patios. Do not place oak furniture directly on these surfaces
- Since oak is very heavy and cannot be moved inside during inclement weather, custom-fit outdoor covers are strongly recommended to provide protection from the elements
- Due to natural variations in the wood and artisan craftsmanship, no two items are exactly alike. Distinctive nicks, exposed knots and imperfections should be expected. Oak will gradually lighten in color with sun exposure.
- After 6-12 months, oak will turn a silvery grey depending on climate.

OAK CARE

- Use a dry, clean cloth to dust your furniture weekly and help maintain its luster and prevent staining
- Thoroughly clean your furniture twice a year
- To clean furniture, use your garden hose to help loosen dirt and debris that has accumulated in corners and crevices. Adjust the nozzle to a fan pattern (as opposed to a small jet stream), and maintain 6"-10" between the nozzle and the surface of the furniture
- For tougher stains, clean with a warm water and mild dishwashing-soap solution. Gently scrub the wood with a soft-bristle brush in the direction of the grain. Rinse thoroughly with water and dry with a soft, clean cloth, making sure all surface water is removed to avoid damage and mildew. Always wipe wood furniture dry after cleaning with water, or any time it gets wet
- Stains, small marks or surface imperfections can be removed by lightly sanding with a fine sandpaper (no less than P120 grit)
- Avoid letting water stand on the surface of your furniture and cushions
- Protect your furniture with our custom-fit covers when not in use. Allow furniture and cushions to completely air-dry before covering
